

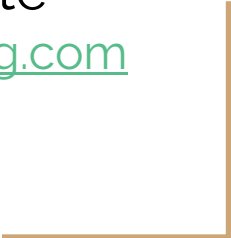

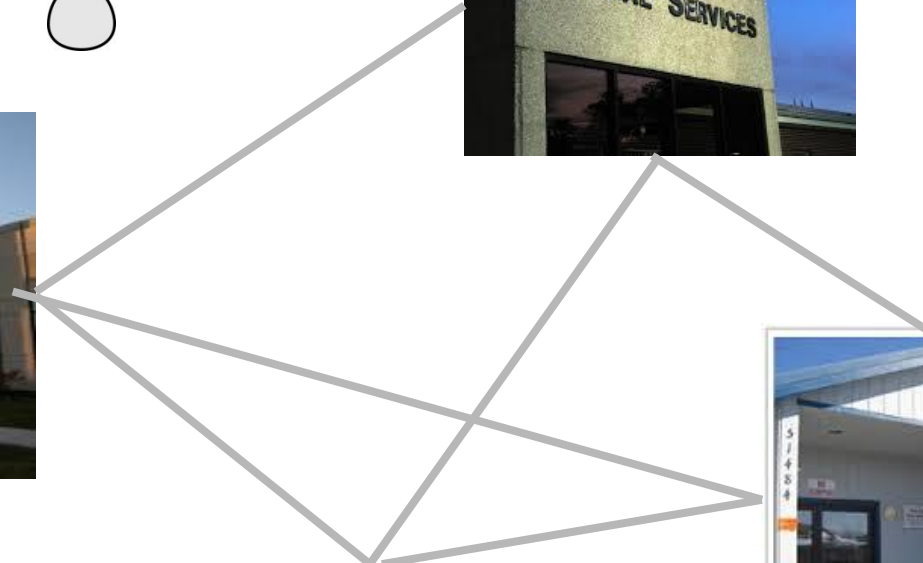
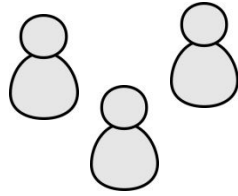

The Network Advantage

Network strategies have the capacity to connect everyone impacted by an issue

Help them see the whole system

Enable them to work collaboratively in a variety of ways to transform that system.

The Network Advantage

Don't Need Network Strategy

1. When the problem is simple
2. When the problem is relatively small and does not impact a large number of people
3. When there is clear evidence of a solution that works

Benefit from Network Strategy

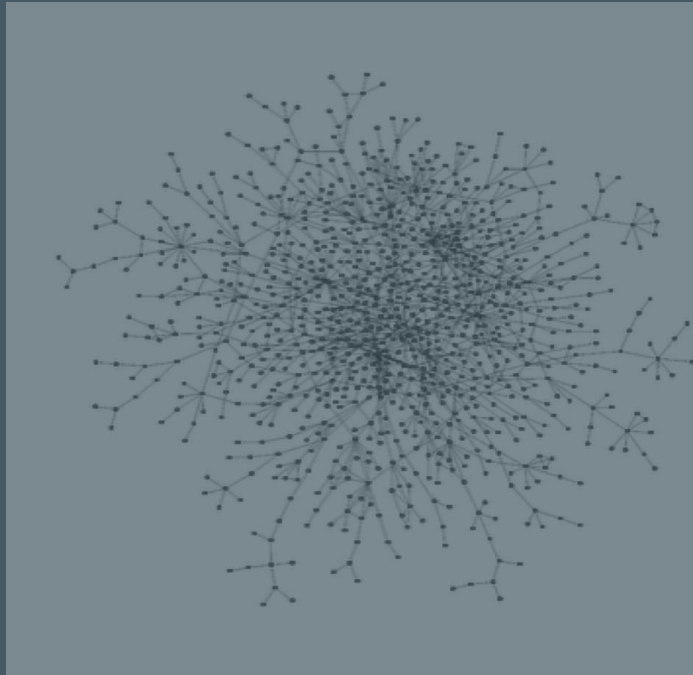
1. When problem is complex
2. When many different groups and individuals are impacted by the problem
3. When there is no obvious or clear solution
4. When experimentation and innovation are needed
5. Want to shift the system so it is effective

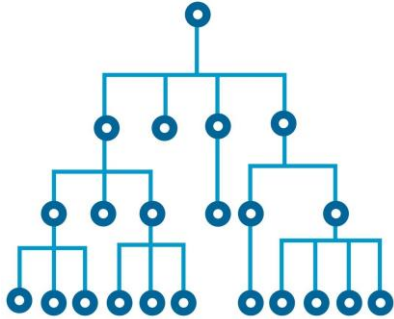
Network Definition



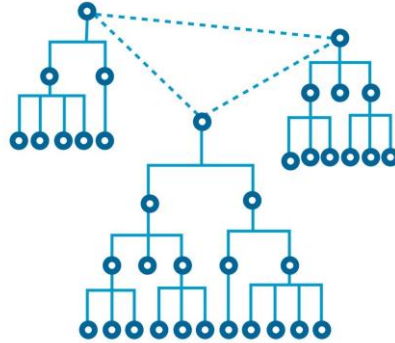
Networks are sets of relationships and the patterns they create that influence the quality of communication and the likelihood of collaboration and innovation.

Intentional Change Networks

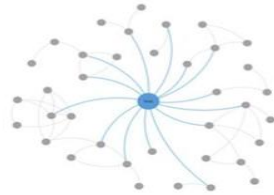


- Core consists of clusters w different perspectives who know of & trust each other

- Action is self-organizing: anyone sees how to make a difference, gathers others and tries an experiment

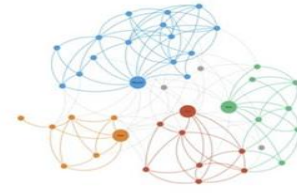

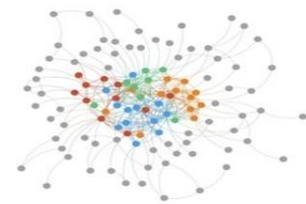
Scattered clusters

Multi-hub

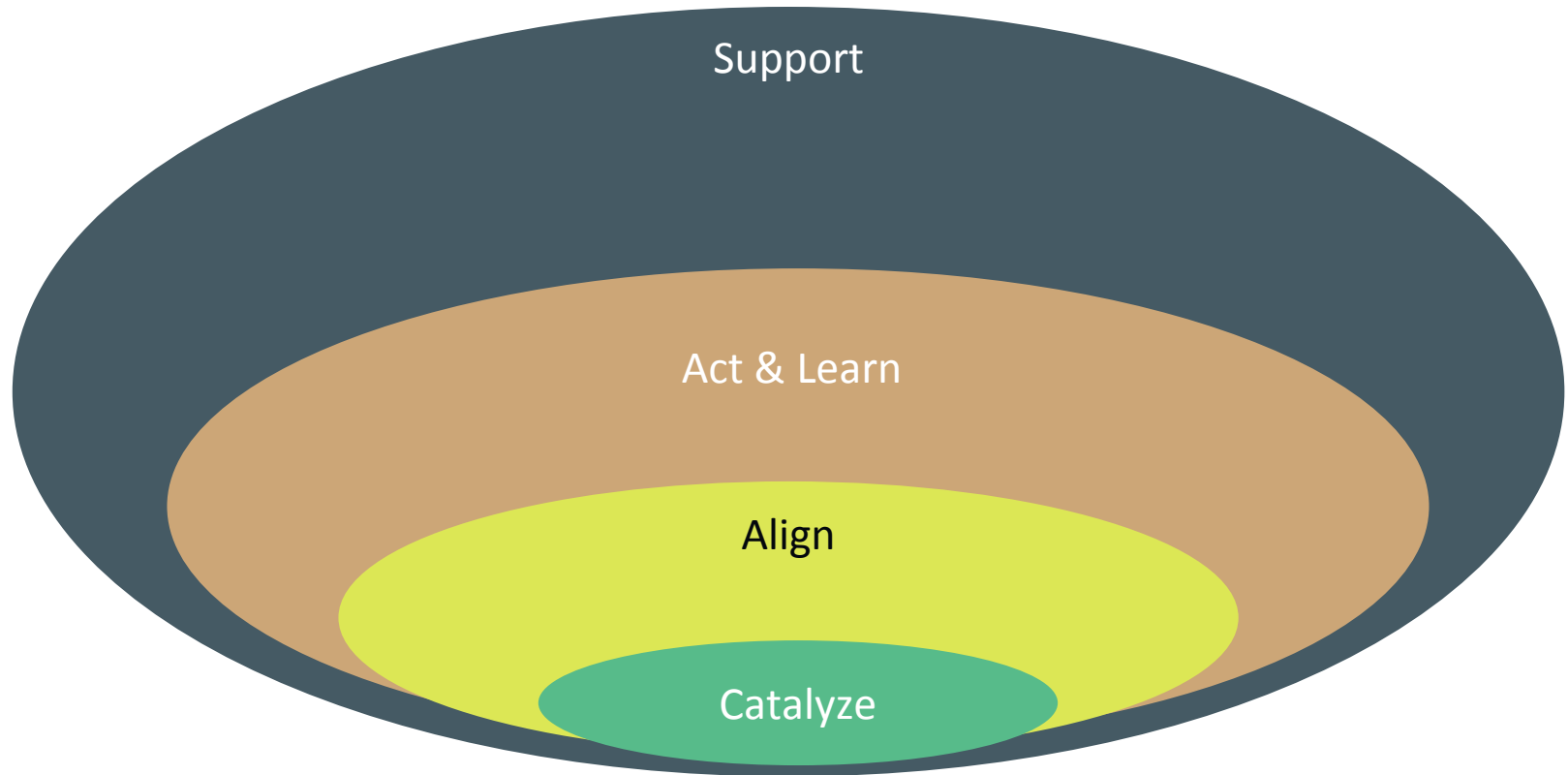

3. Set Up Virtual Communities of Practice



- Small chunks of new learning about skills, etc
- Share what doing/learning
- Peer assists: person brings challenge and gets support
- Breakout groups (small) to build relationships of support

Foundation Examples

Packard Foundation supported a Community of Practice with Funders and Grantee Networks to learn about and practice network strategies


REACH Foundation supports both Face to Face and virtual Community of Practice among Counties

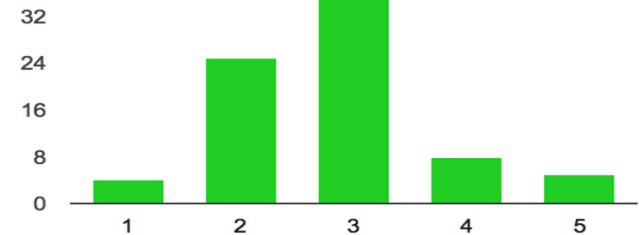
